As researchers, we regularly give credit to the work or ideas of others by citing them in our manuscripts. If we use our own previously published ideas or work, we must cite our previous work to avoid self-plagiarism or duplicate publication. Additionally, the new manuscript must be substantially different in form and content from the original manuscript.

The EDGJ attempts to comply with the publication standards and policies of the American Psychological Association (APA) and the American Society for Engineering Education (ASEE). Both of these organizations provide guidance on these topics; see pages 13-16 of the Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association (Sixth Edition) and ASEE's Policy on Plagiarism and Duplicate Publication (https://www.asee.org/about-us/policies/ASEE_Plagiarism_Policy.pdf).

In the past, authors of mid-year conference papers were encouraged to submit their papers to the Journal since the proceedings were not widely distributed – only given to conference attendees. However, since 2004, the proceedings of the mid-year conference have been published on the division website (http://edgd.asee.org/conferences/proceedings.htm) and are no longer considered to have "limited circulation." Therefore, papers submitted to a mid-year conference or an annual conference must be significantly different from papers submitted to the Journal.

In the future, the mid-year conference submission process will be modified to encourage EDGD members to both participate in mid-year conferences and be able to submit their work to the journal, without being a duplicate publication. For example, publishing the abstracts from the mid-year conference, would allow authors to expand their work into a full paper for submission to the Journal.
